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decoration. The surviving divisions within the Hours BVM (Terce, 61^v; Sext, 65^r; None, 69^r; Vespers, 72^r; Compline, 76^r, along with the intruded Matin for Hours of Holy Spirit, 57^r) are marked by an all-round decorative border filled with stylized foliate scrolls, some naturalistically depicted plants (including daisies and strawberries), and urns. The incipit itself is headed by 3-line-high initial, set on a golden panel, its bowl filled with a spray of three daisies. All gaudily coloured, but routine in execution. Other principal subdivisons are headed by a 2-line-high gold initial filled with red, set against a blue panel (or vice versa), with white hair-line patterning; the same style was used for the KL monograms in the kalendar. Beginnings of prayers and verses are marked by a 1-line-high gold initial filled with red, set against a blue panel (or vice versa), with white hair-line patterning. Line fillers: (larger) a bar, half blue, half red, covered with white hair-line patterning and with a gold dot at the centre; (smaller) a

gold dot with radiating lines, sometimes painted red and blue.

PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION

Parchment: smooth and thin, sometimes glossy; hair follicles often readily visible. FH, HF. Fols. i (parchment flyleaf, unfoliated) + ii (medieval flyleaves, ruled to same pattern as main book, foliated 'ii', 'ii') + 293 (foliated 'iii', 'i'–'17', '17bis'–'289', then two unfoliated leaves) + ii (unfoliated medieval parchment endleaves—ruled to the same pattern as the main book but bound in upside down). Modern pencil foliation (lower margin, gutter).

Size: 152×105 mm. Written area: 93×68 mm. Two columns (width 30 mm). Written above top line. Lines. Fols. i–148 (Qq. I–XV): 34. Fols. 149–289 (Qq. XVI–XXX): 36. (Space between lines, 2.5–3 mm; height of minims, 1 mm.) Pricking: awl. Ruling: hard point and lead (often lead for verticals, hard point for horizontals). Single vertical boundaries; horizontals confined within the verticals; none extended.

Collation: medieval flyleaves (fols. i–ii) 2 ; I (fols. iii, I–9) 10 –XV 10 ; XVI (149–56) 8 (the central leaves [fols. 152, 153] singletons, stuck together at the joint); XVII–XXIX 10 ; XXX (fols. 287–9 + two unfoliated leaves) 5 (= 6 with leaf 6 cancelled); medieval endleaves (unfoliated) 2 . Early quire letter plus leaf numbering (arabic numerals) in the first half of quires, lower front corner of rectos; a cross on the first recto of the second half of the quire.

Bloomfield, no. 5052; Kaeppeli, no. 436—this MS. not listed. The colophon relates to the completion of the work itself; if there were any reference to the scribes, date, or first owner of this particular copy, it may have featured in the three lines of text, now thoroughly erased, that immediately followed the authorial colophon.

SCRIBES AND SCRIPT

Textualis rotunda; quite heavily abbreviated. Number of scribes uncertain; however, whereas from iii^r to 148^v the size and aspect of the script regularly evolve, from 149^r to 289^v (Qq. XVII–XXXI) they remain constant, indicating that this at least is the stint of a single

hand. + Light annotation and correction in a current Italian hand, s. xv: e.g. 105^v, 106^v, 108^r, 108^v, 109^r, 111^r.

DECORATION

First page of text (fol. i^r) has an all-round border of foliage and flowers in green, blue, and maroon, liberally scattered with golden balls. The 8-line high initial Q, constructed from the same foliage, is historiated with a standing friar (presumably Bartholomaeus) holding a book and a cross, set in a simple landscape. The first entry for a new letter of the alphabet is marked by a 3-line-high Lombard capital, blue flourished in red (or red flourished in purple); the flourishing normally includes sets of vertical lines, some of which bisect the letter form itself. Each new entry within a letter of the alphabet is marked by 2-line-high capitals of the same form and colouring (guide letters remain visible under them). Paraphs (alternately blue then red) mark subsections within entries. Sentence capitals generally stroked in red.

PROVENANCE

(1) S. xix–xx pencil codes and initials by various booksellers and/or private owners, iiv–iiir ('1499'; '3/+/+'; 'j & j d. 29/iii/99'; plus another (erased) at the foot of iiiv). Bookseller's/auctioneer's loose slip of paper with reference numbers (414. 2894) plus dimensions and name of author. Cutting from auction or sale catalogue with summary description, pasted to iv—from which presumably purchased by (2) Francis Chatillon Danson of Liverpool (1855–1926) (his bookplate inside front board—this produced no earlier than 1920 when he was knighted, as it titles him 'Sir'). Thence by descent to (3) John Raymond Danson (1893–1976). (4) Trinity College, by bequest of J. R. Danson, in 1976. College shelfmark pencilled on iv.
