First (surviving) page devoted to commentary (190^v):] Non uidetur quierrat consentire et cetera. [E]rror consensum impedit qui rem contingit ... SCRIBES AND SCRIPT

(1) Main text. A late Romanesque Caroline Minuscule with letter-forms that are essentially Caroline but with a lateral compression and broken curving strokes that betoken Protogothic; generally spacious and stately. Most of the commentary and apparatus is probably by the same scribe; but here the script, smaller and more compressed, is more Protogothic in aspect. (2) Fol. 195^v / col. i; 200^r / col. ii. Protogothic, smaller and more rectilinear than the commentary hand of Scribe 1.

DECORATION

No initials supplied. In both his sections, Scribe 2 deployed little beast heads to isolate overruns.

England (southern, ?Kent); s. XV^{med-3/3} (Part C datable ?pre-1448, certainly pre-1475; Part A datable incrementally post 1458–78)

GENERAL

Paper, strengthened by parchment guards at centres and outsides of quires (an original feature—the writing on 3^v ends, and that on 4^r begins, on the parchment strips). Fols. i (modern paper) + i (medieval parchment flyleaf, foliated 'ii') + 156 (foliated '1'–'30', '31+32', '33'–'156') + i (modern paper, foliated '157'). Modern pencil foliation (with some second alternative numberings on certain folios up to 27).

Size: 280 × 200 mm. Three separable sections: (A) fol. 1–6; (B) fol. 7–33; (C) fol. 34–156. They were evidently produced at different dates in s. xv (Part C before Part A—which itself would seem to have been accretive) and then attracted additions. All parts had been brought together by s. xv^{4/4} (*teste* notes on ii^v,

list of contents on 1^r, and the correspondences between 1 and 156), and were probably joined to the current medieval flyleaf (fol. ii) too (*teste* similarities in script and content between the additions on ii^v and the material on 1 and 156). They may still have been receiving additions thereafter.

Panelled style, s. xviii, probably by Sedgley; blind-tooled mottled and plain calf, a fleuron at each corner of the inner compartment; gold-tooled armorial book-stamp of Trinity College on both covers; red-edged leaves; MS. number in gilt on spine; 288 × 207 × 50 mm.

COMMON PROVENANCE

PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION

Parchment. Cropped and weathered with loss of text; reused upside down. Noticeable H/F contrast. Two columns. 43 lines remain. Column width: 88 mm. Space between lines, 5–6 mm; height of minims, 3 mm. Augmented at outer edge with thin strips taken from a different leaf.

CONTENTS

- (a) Main leaf, original portion: canon law (including a run of decretals of Boniface VIII).
- (b) Added strips: parts of two lines of text are visible: ‘utem et augmentum’; ‘... anime vestre fr[?patru]m totius prouincie orationibus recommendentur in nostro provinciali’.
- (c) Additions, ii^v: notes on Thomas Becket and on the Franciscans.

Two sets of notes (the correct way up for the current orientation of the leaf) inserted into blank space at the top (originally the lower margin), in a single s. xv English hand, under the heading ‘Nota bene’:

Original. Main leaf: Textualis Rotunda. Added strips: Textualis, northern European. Additions: Bastard Secretary.

DECORATION

Sections of original text headed by 2- to 3-line-high initials, red or blue, bisected vertically by one or two lines in the other colour. Red and blue paraphs.

Item 1 is centred in the upper margin as if it were a title; 2–9, 10–18, and 19–24 are presented thus as three subgroups, the first entry of each flagged by a ¶; 25 is set further to the left than the rest; 26 has six lines, the ends of the last lost owing to a section of the page having been torn out. Entries are linked, generally in pairs, by bracing lines; the thematic cohesion between such linked entries varies considerably. All were written by a single hand.

Other such phrases (including one [32] in English) were then fitted in beside the original entries by different hands: 27. Nota bene. Also added in a slightly bolder hand, underlined and boxed: ‘Speculum peccatoribus. Liber qui vocatur dorm[ir]e secure. Liber de gestis Romanorum’—i.e. the titles of the texts in Parts B and C. (b) Fol. 1^v. Scriptural apothegms. Abhominacio est domino labia mendacia. *proverbiorum xiii^o* ...

Sequence of 24 scriptural apothegms plus the biblical references; written by the same scribe as contributed those on 156^r—Part C item (f).

Acephalous and lacunose, owing to area torn out.

SCRIBES AND SCRIPT

A series of short stints by divers s. xv^{2/2} hands, often several per page. Secretary, varying in formality and aspect from one hand to the next. The collection of form letters presumably grew incrementally over a period of time not earlier than 1458–78.

PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION

Paper. Watermark: hillock, its details hidden in the gutter, fol. 23. Two ?wax stains on 26^v. Fols. 27. Principal foliation runs ‘7’–‘30’, ‘31+32’ (i.e. both numbers on one leaf), ‘33’.

Text-block: 175 × 125 mm. Lines: 32–5 (space 4–5 mm, height of minims, 1 mm). Pricking: folis. 20–6

punctured with widely spaced prickings in all three outer margins (as if to guide a grid / chequer board pattern) which were unused. Frame-ruled in ink.

Collation: I¹⁰; II–III⁸. No signatures or catchwords. Most of the leaves in Q. I are detached.

Set of paragraphs on the seven deadly sins—Superbia, Inuidia, Ira, Accidia, Auaritia, Gula, Luxuria. A catena of citations, the names of the authorities (Ambrose, Augustine, Bernard, Cassiodorus, Gregory, Isidore, Jerome, Paul, various Prophets, Seneca, Solomon) sometimes flagged in margins as well as main text. Related to, but not from, William Peraldus according to R. Newhauser and I. P. Bejczy, *A Supplement to Morton W. Bloomfield et al., ‘Incipits of Latin Works on the Virtues and Vices’, 1100–1500 A.D.* (Turnhout, 2008), no. 5600a, though listed as his in Kaeppeli, no. 1622: vol. ii, p. 139.

The start, on 21^r, is set out in two columns; the main part, on 21^v, in three; the qualities listed under each virtue and vice are joined together by lines and braces.

Part C (fols. 34–156). Sermons. *Gesta Romanorum*

PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION

Paper. Watermarks: difficult to identify; the most clearly visible (64 and 76, inner margin) a dog or dragon. Fols. 123. Fols. 34^r–149^r frame-ruled in ink.

Two patterns. Fols. 34^r–139^r: text-block 174 × 115 mm; lines c.41 (space 4 mm; height of minims, 1–2 mm). Fols. 139^v–149^r: text-block 221 × 151 mm; lines 57 (space 4 mm; height of minims, 1 mm). Fols. 149^v–56^v are unruled, their written area informal and variable.

Collation: I–XV⁸; XVI³ (structure unclear; 156 is now glued along the gutter to 155). Qq. I–X marked 'a'–'k' and leaves numbered in first half. Catchwords within decorated scrolls on Qq. I–IX.

Set of 58 dominical sermons in liturgical order, for the Temporale. Rubrics in plummet/crayon in side margins and in ink in upper margins identify the occasion for each. Light contemporary annotation of those for the 1st, 2nd, and 8th Sundays after Trinity Sunday. Appended to the end of the collection (107^v) by a different hand is a short formulaic refrain: Cite ante, Cite retro, Cite a dextris, Cite a sinistris, Cite deorsum, Cite sursum ... Cite et fugite. Cite et adquirite.




Fig. 78. MS. 71, fol. 156^v (reproduced at 75%).

In scribe 2's stint they are red, added as part of a separate rubrication process. Elaborate scrolls with shading frame the catchwords of Qq. I–IX.
