PD13. Old Library, I.7.4

Constitutiones Clementinae with apparatus

Northern Europe (possibly England); s. XIV

PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION

Two folios, in situ as pastedowns; the exposed side of the front leaf was originally a verso, that of the rear leaf a recto. Parchment. Size: 320 × 194 mm. Written area of primary text, 120 × 100 mm. Two columns (width, 43 mm). Text-block (text and apparatus): 298 × 180 mm (cropped on outer edge with loss of apparatus). Lines of main text: 24 (space, 5 mm; height of minims, 2.5 mm). Lines of apparatus: 86 (space, 4 mm; height of minims, 2 mm). Pricking: none survives. Ruling: lead. Planned for all-round apparatus in two parts.

The main text on the front leaf is *Constitutiones Clementinae*, Liber V, titulus III, c. 3: *Corpus*, ed. Friedberg, ii, col. 1183.

SCRIPT

Textualis semi-quadrata (the strokes relatively thick in relation to their height) for both text and apparatus.

DECORATION

Red and blue initial, flourished in both colours, 3 lines high, modest quality, for the 'G' of Graui in the main text. Blue initial, flourished in red, 2 lines high, for subsection in main text and within Apparatus. Paraphs, alternately red then blue. Running heading ('L' on the verso, Book number on the recto) in red and blue.

Bede, *In Samuelem prophetam*, etc. (Basel, 1533); donor: Thomas Rawe, canon of Windsor (d. 1556). Oxford binding: Ker, *Pastedowns*, p. 18 (no. 179). Sister leaf in Balliol College, 570.h.10 (ibid., p. 15, no. 143).

PD14. Old Library, I.7.12

Breviary (partly noted)

England or northern France; s. XII^{4/4}

PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION

Two bifolia, both so cut down as to leave the greater part of one folio but only a narrow strip of the conjoint other half; in situ as front and rear pastedowns. Parchment. Cropped page size: 208 × 195 mm. Written area: now 200 × 135 mm from an estimated original size of c.240–50 × 135 mm. Two columns (column width, 62 mm). Lines: 31 surviving from an original 36–40 (space,

7 mm; height of minims, 3 mm for ordinary text, 2 mm for cues, 1.5 mm for sections planned for notation). Pricking: lost. Ruling: lead.

CONTENTS

Front, left-hand side: // munere multas cum iam pro christi superasset nomine penas coronari. *Lc ii*. Affuit ergo sanctus georgius capadocie regionis genere ortus,

aspiciens ... R. Inclitus christi miles georgius deo omnium creatori iustius esse immolandum predica / . Front, right-hand side (narrow strip): // multe sunt alleluia ... *In Inuentione sancte crucis*. Dulce lignum dulces clausos ... Christus reconciliauit nos ... R. Per tuam crucem salua nos ... qui mort // . Rear, left-hand side (narrow strip): // artyre per pesso plagarum uerbera ... iratus ?delu// . Rear, right-hand side: // Deus qui nos annua apostolorum tuorum philippi et iacobi solempnitate letificas ... se nescire. Quid opus dicere erat// .

Portions of Offices of St George (front leaf), of Philip and James (rear leaf, plus front narrow strip), and Holy Cross (front narrow strip)—i.e. the remnants of a section covering late April to the beginning of May. Although various responses, verses, and antiphons

are presented with a red four-line staff, only a couple of those on one leaf (the narrow strip at the front, bearing parts of Philip and James and Holy Cross) have notation; the remainder are unused.

SCRIPT

Transitional Protogothic to Textualis (the moderate angularity of the former, the matrix of the latter).

DECORATION

Capitals, 2+ lines high, alternately red then green.

HOST BOOK

Quincuplex Psalterium (Paris, 1509); donor: Thomas Rawe, canon of Windsor (d. 1556). Oxford binding: Ker, *Pastedowns*, p. 3 (no. 24).

PD15. Old Library, I.7.14

Aristotle, *Sophistici elenchi*

England or France; s. XIII^{ex}

PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION

One folio. Formerly the rear pastedown; now raised and followed by a modern paper endleaf plus pastedown. Parchment, moderate to low quality with prominent follicles. Size: 260 × 175 mm. Text-block: 158 × 95 mm. Planned for all-round glossing. Lines: 32 (space, 5 mm; height of minims, 2 mm). Pricking: none survives. Ruling: lead. Double verticals to either side of text block; two further pairs of narrowly spaced verticals in the outer margin, one pair in the inner margin to define zones for glossing. First two or three and last two horizontals extended; three further horizontals in the lower margin define zones for glossing.

CONTENTS

// ¶Amp[lius] non danda, dicto ?uel nominatim ... De soloecismus autem ... Oportet etiam intelligere ... deest aliqua talium interrogationum, de qua or—// From *Sophistici elenchi*, chs. 32–3. Areas of the verso obscured by glue damage. Extensive glossing,

interlinear and in all margins; the interlinear glossing s. xiii/xiv, the marginal glossing in various strata extending from s. xiii / xiv to xv^r.

SCRIPT

Main text: Textualis libraria. Glossing: cursives of differing degrees of formality.

DECORATION

Chapters headed by blue initials, 2+ lines high, flourished in red. Subsections marked by red parags.

HOST BOOK

Manuale secundum usum insignis ... Sarum (Antwerp: Christophorus Endoniensis, 1523). Donor unknown. Oxford binding: Ker, *Pastedowns*, p. 75 (no. 807a). *Aristoteles Latinus. Pars posterior*, ed. G. Lacombe et al. (Cambridge, 1955), no. 2004; Thomson, *Aristotle*, no. 395.
